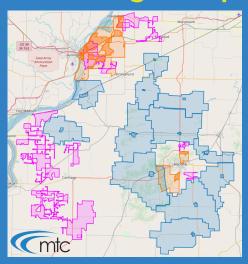

2022 Meeting Minutes >

The 71st Annual Meeting of the Membership of McDonough Telephone Cooperative was held at The Crossing in Macomb, Illinois, on Wednesday, August 24, 2022, at 7:00 P.M. Food was served to members in attendance prior to the meeting, via a drive through option or inside dining, and the OnStage Band provided entertainment.

Chairman Leroy Tappe welcomed the membership and introduced Ben Ellefritz, Pastor at The Crossing, who gave the invocation. Scout Troop 315 presented the Flag and led the membership in the Pledge of Allegiance.

Chairman Tappe announced that sufficient members were present for a quorum and called the meeting to order. Total membership attendance was 256. Chairman Tappe introduced the members of the Board, as well as McDonough Power Directors Steve Hall, Steve Lynn, and Harold Anderson and retired McDonough Telephone Director Jerry Payne, who were in attendance. Chairman Tappe asked Board member Lanny Carson to join him on the stage. Leroy announced that Lanny was retiring from the Board after thirty years of service, including his service as Board Chairman on two different occasions. Leroy thanked Lanny for his service as a committed and active member of the Board of Directors. Lanny addressed the membership and thanked the members for their support during his time on the Board.

Chairman Tappe asked Board Secretary Rose Marie Lynn to read the Notice of the Meeting and to present the 2021 Annual Meeting Minutes. Secretary Lynn read the notice of the meeting and stated that the 2021 Annual Meeting minutes were printed in the Annual Meeting notice. No member requested that the minutes be read and Secretary Lynn moved that the 2021 Annual Meeting minutes be approved as printed in the Annual Meeting Notice. Chairman Tappe asked for and received a second to the motion, which passed on a voice vote.

Chairman Tappe called upon Treasurer Jay Morrison for the Treasurer's report. Treasurer Morrison stated that the Treasurer's report was mailed to all members in their Annual Meeting Notice. Jay confirmed that the financial statements for the 2021 calendar year had been audited by the firm of BKD, CPAs and Advisors and asked if anyone had any questions. After receiving no questions about the financial information, Treasurer Morrison moved that the Treasurer's Report be approved as printed in the Annual Meeting Notice. Chairman

Tappe requested and received a second to the motion, which carried on a voice vote.

In his report to the membership, Chairman Tappe discussed the commitment of the Cooperative to provide high-speed, quality communication services in our part of Illinois and our commitment to serve our communities. Between the Cooperative and its subsidiary, we have now provided high-speed Internet service to 5,333 customers. We continue to receive requests for Internet service. The cost of constructing the infrastructure is high and, unfortunately, the state and federal government subsidy programs have further driven up the cost of construction. Leroy also explained the decision of the Board to terminate its cable TV service at the end of this year. The unregulated cost of content has resulted in losses in excess of \$250,000 per year. Our highspeed broadband service gives our members the ability to obtain the content of their choice from numerous content providers. Leroy noted that the MEG Fund, operated by our employees, donated \$17,400 to charitable organizations during 2021. Leroy thanked the employees and the Board members for their dedication and support.

Leroy also thanked the West Prairie After Prom 2024 committee for their assistance with the food and cleanup, the Macomb Boy Scout Troop 315, and the Onstage Band for providing the entertainment.

Chairman Tappe introduced President Jay Griswold. Jay report by thanking Cooperative began members, the Board of Directors and Cooperative employees. Jay announced that Joyce Faxon would be retiring on Oct. 7, and recognized her for her 26 years of service to the Coop. Jay provided a summary of accomplishments over the last year, including the anticipated completion of Fiber to the Home for all Cooperative members, by the end of 2022, a full year ahead of schedule. Fiber to the Home has allowed the Cooperative to increase Internet connection speeds, which we have now done at no additional charge. President Griswold also commented on the NTCA Smart Rural Communities initiative and happily reported that, by the end of 2022, every community that we serve will qualify as a Smart Rural Community. discussed the upgrade to symmetrical speeds for all residential customers. Jay also summarized the work being done through MTC Communications to provide reliable and affordable broadband services to other communities in west central Illinois. The Cooperative believes that the expansion outside of Cooperative exchanges is an important strategic plan to the long-term success of the Cooperative. Jay also summarized grant programs that the Cooperative is taking advantage of to make the construction of broadband networks in rural areas affordable.

President Griswold then introduced John McMillan, Cooperative Attorney, for the election of Directors. Attorney McMillan started with the introduction of Ryan Hunt, Chairperson of the Nominating Committee. Ryan reported on the results of the Nominating Committee meeting, held on June 9, 2022. After the report of the Nominating Committee Chairperson, John introduced Paul Butterfield, the member nominated to replace Lanny Carson as the Board member representing the Colchester Exchange. John stated that we did not receive any nominations by petition and asked for a motion to close the nominations and have the Secretary cast a unanimous ballot for the unopposed candidates. After motion, second and a voice vote, John declared the following candidates elected to serve for a three-year term on the Board of Directors:

District No. 3, Industry/Littleton Jason Chancy
District No. 4, Good Hope Randy Grove
District No. 5, Colchester Paul Butterfield

Attorney McMillan turned the meeting over Rachel Kerns, Director of Marketing & Public Relations, who conducted the drawing for door prizes. The Youth prize of an 8-inch Fire Tablet was won by Casen Melvin. The grand prizes were won by the following:

2023 Financial Report

CAPITAL CREDIT REPORT

Under Article X, Sections 1 and 2, Bylaws of McDonough Telephone Cooperative, Inc. read in part, "In order to induce patronage and to ensure that the Cooperative will operate on a non-profit basis, the Cooperative is obligated to account on a patronage basis to all its Members for all amounts received and receivable from the furnishings of Broadband and Communications services in excess of operating cost and expenses properly chargeable against the furnishing of such services. All such amounts in excess of operating costs and expenses for Broadband and Communications services at the moment of receipt by the Cooperative are received with the understanding that they are furnished by the Members as capital.

The Cooperative is obligated to pay by credits to a capital account for each Member all such amounts in excess of operating costs and expenses derived from Broadband and Communications services. The books and records of the Cooperative shall be set up and kept in such a manner that at the end of each fiscal year the amount of capital, if any, so furnished by the Member for Broadband and Communications services is clearly reflected and credited in an appropriate record to the capital account of each Member.

For patronage and capital credit account purposes, the term "all amounts received and receivable from the furnishing of Broadband and Communications services" shall include all amounts billed to and paid by the Member to the Cooperative for Broadband and Communications services, whether such services are provided to the Member directly by the Cooperative or indirectly from a wholly-owned subsidiary of the Cooperative. The Cooperative shall, within a reasonable time after the close of the fiscal year, notify each Member of the amount of capital so credited to the Member's account. All such amounts credited to the capital account of any Member shall have the same status as though they had been paid to the Member in cash in pursuance of a legal obligation to do so and the Member had then furnished the Cooperative corresponding amounts of capital. Any operating losses of the Cooperative shall be offset by subsequent year's margins prior to allocation."

Allocation assigned to each member is based on each dollar which the member has paid to McDonough Telephone Cooperative in 2022, and is arrived at by dividing total margins by the service revenue received, or .57924890 per dollar.

Patronage capital is used for plant improvements and reduces the need for the Cooperative to borrow funds for this purpose.

The capital credit funds are assignable to the books of the Cooperative. For answers to questions concerning capital credits or other services, please call the business office.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT Opinion

We have audited the consolidated financial statements of McDonough Telephone Cooperative, Inc. and subsidiary, which comprise the consolidated balance sheets as of December 31, 2022 and 2021, and the related consolidated statements of operations, members' equity and cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the consolidated financial statements.

In our opinion, the accompanying consolidated financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of McDonough Telephone Cooperative, Inc., and subsidiary, as of December 31, 2022 and 2021, and the results of their operations and their cash flows for the years then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audits in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAS). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the "Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Consolidated Financial Statements" section of our report. We are required to be independent of McDonough Telephone Cooperative, Inc. and subsidiary, and to meet our ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audits. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Emphasis of Matter

As discussed in Note 14 to the consolidated financial statements, in 2022, the entity adopted new accounting guidance ASC 842 Accounting for Leases. Our opinion is not modified with respect to this matter.

Responsibilities of Management for the Consolidated Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the consolidated financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of consolidated financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the consolidated financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about McDonough Telephone Cooperative, Inc., and subsidiary's ability to continue as a going concern for one year after the date that the consolidated financial statements are available to be issued.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Consolidated Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the consolidated financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgement made by a reasonable user based on the consolidated financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with GAAS, we:

- Exercise professional judgement and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the consolidated financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the consolidated financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the McDonough Telephone Cooperative, Inc. and subsidiary's internal control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the consolidated financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgement, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the McDonough Telephone Cooperative, Inc. and subsidiary's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.

The accompanying financial statements, which consolidate the accounts of the Cooperative, have been prepared in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

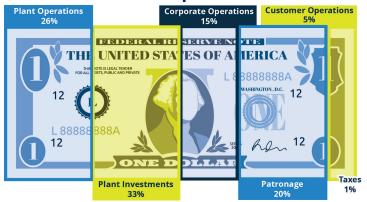

Our Accounting Department monitors compliance with these. The system of internal accounting control on an ongoing basis is reviewed, evaluated and revised as necessary in view of the results of the internal and independent audits, Management recommendation, changes in the Cooperative's business and other conditions which come to Management's attention. The Board of Directors believes that the Cooperative's system, taken as a whole, provides reasonable assurance: (1) that financial records are adequate and can be relied upon to permit the preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles, and (2) that access to assets is permitted only in accordance with the Board's authorization. Recorded financial data is reviewed by the Board of Directors monthly to assure the continued successful operation of the Cooperative.

These financial statements have been examined by FORVIS LLP, Certified Public Accountants. Their examination is in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and includes selective tests of transactions and a review in the internal accounting control.
